

Despite all our snowbird friends who

have flown the coop, MISPS keeps busy with many activities. The vessel safety checks have reached an all-time high for our squadron—236 to date! We continue to be second in the district. D22 has 142 examiners who have done 2231 examinations and passing 2156 vessels. Keep up the good work!!

We are doing well but more needs to be done to keep our waterways safe. Cooperative charting is one of those venues. This program is a major public service of USPS. Under it, squadron members supply information to the Marine Chart Division leading to corrections to nautical charts, small craft charts, or Coast Pilot publications and Small Craft Facilities. The Aids to Navigation Inspection program allows for damaged or misplaced Aids to be reported. The Adopt-A-Chart subprogram provides for individual squadrons to assume responsibility to keep a chart or a portion of a chart in their local boating area up to date and get recognition on new editions for their work. The Cooperative Charting Program is recognized as the most effective userparticipation program in all of the Federal services. Let's see what MISPS can do.

In the publicity department the team of Moe Bishop, 1/Lt Kathleen Reynolds, AP and Lt Doug Curnutte, AP, keep our squadron visible in the media. Notices in the *Marco Eagle* for the Captains Meetings have made people aware of our squadron. I heard from one person that MISPS is always in the papers. The June 13-26 issue of the *Coastal Breeze* has a USPS article "*I'm Grounded, and I Can't Get Off!*" that includes information on how to reach MISPS. Good work! Let's make our squadron and the United States Power Squadrons® a household name.

Schedules for courses and seminars for the Fall of 2014 and Winter of 2015 will be published in the next Eagle's Eye. There is still plenty of time to let me know what topics are of interest. We can create a class/seminar on almost any boating topic if one does not already exist. On-the-water-training is also available for members who have completed Seamanship, Piloting and or Advanced Piloting. This training on your boat must be scheduled and incorporated in the minutes of the Executive Committee to cover the insurance concerns. If you are interested let me know.

Recently Commander Carl Thieme, SN, Lt/C Peggy Reiss, AP-IN and myself met with representatives from the Marco Island United States Coast Guard Auxiliary to discuss how we can work together. One topic (also discussed during MISPS's recent Marine Electronic Course on Communications) was the use and clarification of the relatively new Digital Selective Calling feature on VHF radios. Following the meeting the USCG Aux contacted the Coast Guard and verified that unless a VHF radio has an MMSI number no message will be transmitted when the little red button on your VHF radio is pushed. (That button is the simple way to make a MAY DAY call on channel 70.) Further, if the radio is not connected to a turned on GPS no information on your location will be transmitted which lessens or prolongs the chances of someone coming to your aid. MMSI numbers are free and readily available through the power squadron or directly on line via a computer from Boat US.

Emergency position indication radio beacon

Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon or as they are more commonly called EPIRB's are becoming more affordable and as a result more popular. But, how do they apply to the recreational boater?



While a reliable DSC capable VHF radio properly interfaced with your GPS is a good emergency safety feature for a boater who stays within the VHF range of a shore based U.S. Coast Guard facility (approximately 20 miles) if you spend time further offshore the EPIRB offers peace of mind to the boater should an emergency arise. So it is good to have an understanding of the capabilities of these units to determine if they should be a part of your on board safety equipment. Prior to the development of the 406 MHz system, the earlier EPIRBs were costly and principally directed to the commercial market.

Over the past 10-15 years with improved satellite availability and the development of the 406 MHz satellite system technology, in addition to the development of the Personal Locator Beacon (PLB) the price of safety in an emergency offshore has improved significantly. EPIRB's are registered to a specific vessel while PLB's are registered to an individual and either can be purchased with or without GPS enhancement which while adding to the cost of the unit can save valuable and potentially lifesaving time in an emergency rescue scenario. GPS enhanced devices are recommended strongly by the Coast Guard. The EPIBB has a minimum battery life of 48 hours compared to a 24 hour life of the PLB battery and the former are designed to float, transmit when wet and have an integral strobe light which PLB's may or may not. In addition the EPIRB may also be activated automatically upon release from their holding bracket (category 1) although this feature is not universal and some may require manual activation (category 2). Knowing where to look is obviously an important consideration whenever the Coast Guard launches a Search and Rescue (SAR) operation and these devices help to take the guesswork out of the equation as well as providing the initial signal that a marine distress situation exists.

Vessel Exams top a record 236!

The MISPS Vessel Safety inspection team is doing an excellent job promoting safety on the Island. Our primary focus is to insure that boaters have the proper safety equipment aboard. However during the inspection we typically engage the owner in conversation about general boating topics. This serves to further promote safety by educating boaters (and sometimes learning new things ourselves). If the numbers are a measure of our success, we have far exceeded expectations this year. Our total count of inspected boats is 236! This is a new record for our squadron. It places us second in District 22 ... and, the year is not over!

Safe boating week was celebrated 17 to 23 May. Our team planned a concentrated effort at our local marinas and the personal watercraft rentals. Lt/C Carol Einhart, AP set up an information session at Calusa Marina. P/C Ted Reiss, SN-IN, Lt/C Peggy Reiss, AP-IN, Dave Dumas and Lt Jim O'Connell, P, provided information and examined a number of boats. Ted and Cdr Carl Thieme, SN worked with Rose Marina and examined their entire rental fleet. Lt Alan Epstein, S engaged the Marco Watersports organization and arranged to inspect all of their personal watercraft at 3 locations. Alan recruited "all of the examiners left on Marco Island" to complete this in two days! During Safe Boating week we added 70 vessel inspections to our count and achieved recognition from key boating centers on the Island. Congratulations to the entire team!

Now that most of the winter residents have returned to their summer homes, our focus for the next few months will naturally be on the year round owners. Note to our members, if you haven't had your boat inspected yet please call Lt Tom Ryan (239-389-6585) to schedule an inspection. It only takes 15

minutes and it could save your life. Also keep in mind that an inspection sticker signals the Coast Guard, the Sheriff's Department and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Officers that your boat meets all safety requirements. Plus, some insurance companies offer a discount on boat insurance.





Friday's lunch menu is an all-day menu with a reasonable price range. All meals are from the menu with separate checks.



potential cooperation with varying levels of manpower commitment required. We will meet again in early fall to establish priorities amongst these excellent ideas. Plans for implementation would then be developed recognizing the current full plate of activities underway in each organization. We look forward to working together to improve boating safety in the Ten Thousand Islands area.

Currently there is a considerable amount of construction underway in the building where MISPS's condo is located. They will be opening up a Bar & Grill eating facility on the first floor at the rear of the building facing Walker's Hideaway Marina. The bar and grill will be open for business starting at 1100. This will have a negative impact on the amount of parking spaces available for use by MISPS members, students taking our "Public Courses" and the rest of the business condo owners in the building. We will be monitoring the situation carefully and hopefully can work with the new tenants to alleviate inevitable parking issues.

Considerable progress has been made in several MISPS functions during 2014. The Vessel Safety Check Program, VSC Chair Lt Tom Ryan, S has already examined 236 vessels to date. Public Relations, chaired by Lt Moe Bishop, has been able to place numerous articles in the local media and has secured a MISPS Safe Boating Week Proclamation from the Marco Island City Council. If you have trouble getting a MMSI number let me know. So for safety, first remember to turn on your VHF radio whenever you are underway. Second, get a MMSI number and install it in your VHF radio.

Third, if you have a GPS insure that it is electrically connected to your radio and that it too is turned on while underway. Several sources of information indicate that possibly 80% of the VHF radios are not properly configured! Let's change the statistics.







... Rescue at Sea ...

DOWN TO ONE Capt. Steve Moore, S (P/C) was detached from the fleet and researching the feeding habits of Arius species of Capri Pass, Florida when a cry from the masthead lookout startled the skipper into heightened awareness. "Deck Thar! Sail, two points off the starboard bow, sir". All eyes looked to starboard for a welcome distraction from the tedious task of catch and release. "Deck thar. Strange sail appears to be in irons, sir." Just as the crew was about to make snide remarks about inept would-be sailors, the single mast came down across the port ama of the small catamaran sweeping her crew of 3 over the side. It was only a minute or two before one of the 3 was seen standing amongst the wreckage waving his arms for attention. In the rising afternoon sea breeze they could be in serious trouble in the surf of Coconut Island or in Capri Pass channel.

Captain Moore eased the two big engines into gear as the crew donned his life jacket. "Splice two of the lighter lines from the forward port locker together and stand by to pass the line". **DOWN TO ONE** was soon on plane heading for the still-waving crew scrambling to get aboard the jumble of sail, standing rigging, mainsheet and tramp.

"Is anyone injured? Do you have life jackets"? "No injuries. No life jackets".

The tallest of the three teenage boys took the tiller as the shortest caught the tow line and secured it to the now slack forestay yoke. Captain Moore eased into forward and **DOWN TO ONE** began the slow tow to Hideaway Beach.


They had launched the small *Hobie* Cat from Hideaway beach and were apparently unfamiliar with the small beach cat without a jib and had problems tacking. In trying to drive the boat through the tack, a stay parted and the mast came down.

The three embarrassed but very grateful sailors were abandoned on Hideaway to warp their boat along the beach to their launch point after promising not to venture out again without life jackets.
