

mph and temperature can be -80 F. Historically 248 have died on Everest from 1924 to 2013. It will be interesting to learn of Chris' experiences in this most dangerous endeavor. Fulfilling his dream does not come cheap, I'm sure he'll tell us about that. Chris has a Yale degree, MBA and a Master's Degree in Computer Engineering; he retired at a young age from Microsoft. EDUCATION OFFICER P/C EDWARD H. REISS, SN-IN

The New Year is here with a full schedule of courses, electives, seminars and use of the Boat Simulator. Which ones interest you? I need to know your intentions by January 5th so I can order student manuals for all courses and electives. Piloting, Advanced Piloting and Junior Navigation



begin in January. Each course builds on your knowledge of seamanship and expands your use of charts, compasses, knowing where you are, knowing how to get someplace, knowing how to avoid places, how to predict tides and currents, how to take and use bearings and culminates in how to use the sun and a sextant to determine your location. Electives address four specific subjects: Engine Maintenance, Sail, Weather and Electronic Systems. Information presented in each can be very practical in your everyday boating. This knowledge could make a difference in preventing huge bills or long hours on the water without help in unpleasant conditions.

The Boat Simulator has 10 different scenarios. It consists of three computer screens (front, left and right side views) and controls for speed, steering and trim tabs. When do you want to use the simulator? The schedule is 30-45 minutes for each person on a first come basis anytime during the 6th, 7th or 8th of Feb. Sign up with me to reserve your space.

Also planned are two-hour seminars which focus on very narrow topics. Included this year: Anchoring, VHF/DCS Radios, Paddle Smart, Compass, Rules of the Road and Charting/GPS.

Instructors are ready and waiting to expand your capabilities. Hopefully, there will be no need to cancel any sessions due to lack of interest. So sign up with the various instructors or contact me for the topics that interest you. See the flyer in this issue for dates and times. Let's go boating and be safe and knowledgeable on the water.

Smokey the Bear is a boater too!

The principal problem with a fire aboard a boat is that unlike a house where running across the street to escape the flames is an option, on a boat there's no place to go but overboard. Unfortunately, this violates the second rule of boating: Stay with the boat.



Ironically, if enough of what the boat is floating on can be brought into the boat, the fire can usually be put out. This, however, violates the first law of boating: Keep the water outside the boat. The good news is that boat fires are rare. Out of almost five thousand boat accidents listed in the U.S. Coast Guard's 2011 Recreational Boating Statistics report, only 218 involved some kind of fire or explosion.

There were nearly 12.2 million registered boats in the U.S. in 2011, which made the chances of experiencing a boat fire less than .002 %. Another comforting fact is that diesel fueled boats are less likely to suffer from a fire or explosion than a gasoline powered boat. Statistically speaking, the chances of suffering a fire on your vessel are very small but when they do happen, boat fires are very dangerous. While it's comforting to know they're rare, the ever-present danger of boat fires demands the ultimate diligence on the part of both the boat builder and the boat owner.

The causes of fires aboard in order of frequency are; AC and DC wiring/appliance - 55%, engine/transmission overheat - 24%, fuel leak - 8%, miscellaneous - 7%, unknown - 5%, stove - 1%. The American Boat & Yacht Council (ABYC) standards determine the safe way to build a boat to minimize the chance of a fire developing. The builder can work to build in fire prevention, suppression and detection systems to mitigate the danger, and the owner can stay alert and be prepared to take action if necessary.

In coming safety articles we will deal further with some of the ways that we as the owners and operators of the vessel can further minimize the chances of a

boat fire.

Seven reasons to have your vessel safety check

The *Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron* provides free vessel safety checks. Our objective is to help you determine if you have the proper safety equipment on board. We don't "fail" boats or report them to any enforcement agency and we don't sell any equipment. Our motivation is "safety". We enjoy boating and want to encourage others to do the same - safely.

Why would *you* want to have your vessel safety check? Here are 7 reasons:



<u>Safety Equipment</u> – The US Coast Guard requires that all boats meet certain safety standards which include safety equipment. The particular equipment required depends upon the specific boat. Law enforcement agencies are authorized to stop boats and check to insure that the safety equipment is in good working condition. So you need the equipment on board.

<u>Peace of Mind</u> - When you get the "passed" decal it gives you a sense of confidence that from an equipment point of view you are in good shape. This is particularly important for new boaters who are not sure what is needed.

It may save your life. This sounds a bit dramatic, but since we have little control over engine malfunctions and no control over the weather, it is essential that we have the equipment to see us through boating difficulties. We would not want to get stuck in a channel in heavy fog or blinding rain without lights and a loud sounding device. Even in good

weather we want to make sure we have the means to contact or warn other boaters if we are in a difficult situation, like on a sandbar – which occasionally happens around Marco Island!

<u>Signals others</u> - A "passed" decal on your boat shows others, including enforcement agencies, that you are safety conscious. The decal doesn't guarantee that you will not be stopped. But it demonstrates that you have the proper operational equipment. Furthermore, provided something has not failed since the safety check, you will not get ticketed for an equipment violation, which can be an expensive fine and tends to ruin an otherwise good day on the water.

<u>Save money</u> on insurance. Some insurance companies offer discounted rates for owners who routinely have valid safety inspections. Furthermore, many companies provide discounts for owners who take boating educational classes.

Education - It's an opportunity to meet a dedicated knowledgeable boat owner – the examiner. Often the vessel safety check is a first step towards safety education. It is a good way for new or inexperienced boaters to learn about organizations, classes and other local boating issues and activities.



It's Free -

A safety check takes about 15-20 minutes of your time. Of course, you need to have the equipment, but you need that anyway! Safety exams can be done at any time during the year. The VSC decal is good for one year from 1 Jan to 31 Dec. Vessel safety checks should be done every year. If you would like to have your safety check please contact:

The ABC basic boating course is given to promote safe boating to the public. Six of the November class graduates participated in the "Boat Around Marco" on 3 December. Our Squadron Educational Officer P/C Ted Reiss, SN-IN gave dock-side instructions and made sure boaters properly wore life preservers.

Reiss' boat Just Us II limped into the dock at the yacht club on 2000 RPM's; an engine failure. Consequently, all students were transferred to Lt Bob Mueller's boat, Forever Young, which was able to handle them very well. The group left the M. I. Yacht Club and traveled up the river towards Goodland taking the time to point out safety features on the boat. Traveling past Goodland it was pointed out where all the bars and restaurants were located. Serving as the "guide" Bud Mallard narrated the trip and showed on a chart positions, danger areas, red right returning etc. Past Goodland we were close to Coon Key when we came upon a group of dolphins which proceeded to follow us right behind the boat, doing their thing. 


New members Jo and Jerry Martin
