EDUCATION OFFICER P/C Edward Reiss, SN-IN

The winter education schedule is winding down. Only one ABC course and five seminars remain, however, two seminars are relatively new this year — Powerboat Handling for Boat Owners and Paddle Smart. My aim for the boat handling seminar is to have a classroom presentation on boat handling and then to have an instructor go with you on your boat to



coach you in performing various boat handling operations like docking and anchoring as a start. You can bring your boat and tie up at the bulkhead by our condo building. This seminar on 5 March at 0930 definitely requires advanced registration so send me an email with your interest and boat size/type by 1 March. P/C Peggy Reiss, JN-IN, will bring her kayak to the Paddle Smart class on 10 March at 1300 to let you practice getting into a kayak, learning to paddle and how to be comfortable without getting wet.

Check the dates for the other seminars which are: Rules of the Road (do you know the differences in the rules when you enter the Gulf from the river?), Mariner's Compass (what really makes a compass work and how to interpret the data) and Charting/GPS (the paper and electronic principles to know where you are and how to reach a destination). Let the instructors know you plan to attend. (See P. 18)

Students recently completing the Electronics Navigation course were: Marty Wilhelm, AP; Dennis Trego, N; and Ray Boller, AP. Congratulations to you all.

Filming of five or six safe boating events will be from 1 - 6 March. Five member's boats will be used however we need passengers for each scenario. Any takers for being a movie star for half of a day? You will not need to say anything (the filming crew will dub in the correct words later), the director will let us know what we are expected to do, like how to throw a flotation device to a person in the water, and fun should be had by all.

Planning for the Fall and Winter courses and seminars will start soon. I have two requests. One, what topics are of interest to you? Should we create something different than what was presented this year? Two, who would like some encouragement, instruction, or practice in learning how to teach a USPS topic on safe boating? Please let me know since we need several additional instructors.

So let's go boating and be safe.



SAFETY OFFICER Lt Jack Walsh, N

A 2007 US Coast Guard drowning report found that in water between 70° and 79°F, 8% of accidents resulted in fatality, while in water less than 59°F, 40% of accidents were fatal. The risk of drowning in cold water at 59°F is increased by 500%. A study by the Life-Saving Society the same year found that 60%



drowned in water less than 50° and 34% drowned in water between 50° and 68°F. 43% of these drownings occurred less than 6 feet from safety and 90% were not wearing lifejacket's. The most common reasons given for not wearing a lifejacket were: 1) they were close to shore, 2) they could put the lifejacket on in the water and 3) they didn't need a lifejacket because they could swim.

Drowning in cold water is often not the result of hypothermia. On immersion in cold water three distinct physiologic phases occur. The initial phase which last approximately 1 minute, is the cold shock reflex response with gasping and the inability to breathe. The second phase lasting approximately 10 minutes is the incapacitation of muscles and nerves as the result of the cold temperature causing the inability to swim. The third phase which occurs in approximately 1 hour is hypothermia (1–10–1 Principal).

A lifejacket is essential to get past the first 2 phases and survive long enough to be rescued as without it, the inability to keep your head out of the water will result in drowning within the first 10 minutes. While the above discussion pertains specifically to immersion in cold water, immersion in water of any temperature lower than normal body temperature can lead to hypothermia as the result of the increased rate of heat transmission away from a body in water compared to air. The key to survival is wearing a lifejacket whenever you are on or near the water. The goal is to keep your head and face out of the water while you either try to rescue yourself or wait for rescue to arrive.

0200 on 13 March is the start of Daylight Savings Time Remember to turn your clocks ahead to 0300

FLARE DEMO

Marco Island Sail & Power Squadron with support from . USCGAUX Flotilla 95, M. I. Fire Rescue and M. I. Police held a "hands-on" Flare Demonstration on 2 February at the



M. I. Yacht Club from 1000 to 1300. It was open to members of local boating clubs and fishing club plus event contributors from the USGC Auxiliary, M. I. Fire and Police Departments with over 80 participating. People brought their own flares and were surprised how dangerous the slag drippings from handheld flares could be to the boat deck and to themselves. It became apparent that protective gloves should be worn. Those shooting off flare guns realized that the flare cartridge only lasted about 10 seconds, so they should wait to fire until they see someone who could also see the flare. Those that fired out-of-date flares

found a majority of were "duds". Most participants had never fired a flare and were glad to have the educational opportunity, plus were advised to learn more about the different kind of flares.

On Saturday 10 February thirteen students from the

On Saturday 10 February thirteen students from the January ABC class braved the cool temperature and learned some of the realities of safe boating while reinforcing classroom information. Six boats each with a squadron member acting as narrator started from the Goodland launch ramp after a safety review of each boat's equipment. With everyone wearing a life jacket we progressed south to Coon Key light and then up the Marco River to the green over red junction marker at the mouth of the river. Conditions in the gulf were considered too rough for a safe trip completely around the island by all the boats. Along the trip, the red-right-return concept was pointed out numerous times, particularly at the Jolley Bridge. Students were able to see many bird nests as well. Channels and shallow spots were identified. Crossing and meeting situations were noted as other boats were encountered. Upon returning to Goodland the students were joined by squadron members for a total of 32 for lunch at the Old Marco Lodge. In all, this was a most worthwhile event. Hopefully we can schedule another on the water option after the March ABC class.
