

AP. Several more tests are being scored so stay tuned.

Virtual trainer is on order. My hope is to have it installed by mid-May and available for all squadron members to check their skills. The next Eagle's Eye will have more information. Another purpose is to incorporate the trainer into our classes starting with the America's Boating Course. Not only can you practice docking and driving a boat but there are scenarios incorporating piloting skills such as what course should I be on to rescue a friend and how long will it take to get there. Weather and current can be manipulated to create more real life water conditions. If you accidently hit something a damage indicator tells you how badly you are damaged and if bad enough you will see your boat sink. Who would like to be the first to demonstrate effective boat handling?

At the D22 conference a discussion was held on turning the Seamanship course into a series of seminars; something to look forward to. National USPS finally took the position for Practical on The Water Training if a fee is paid a licensed captain is required. Free exercises like our around the island on students boats do not have this requirement.

Courses and topics for seminars for the Fall and Winter will be identified over the next few months. Please let me know of ANY topic of interest you would like to take or that you think someone else should take. How about a Cruise Planning seminar rather than an eight session course? How about specific manufacturer's GPS/Chartplotter? How about APPS to determine tides and currents or a myriad of other boat related APPS? If you found something that works, let's share it with others.

SAFETY OFFICER Lt Jack Walsh, N

Epoxy

The improper use of epoxy can be injurious and hazardous to your health. But constant vigilance and continuous care for safe and proper use will minimize the hazard. Wear safety glasses, respirators and gloves. Tyvek suits are also great protection. Prolonged contact with



the epoxy resin and hardener can cause an allergic reaction--sensitization--in some people. Once sensitized, the slightest contact with the resin and hardener, their fumes, or even standing dust from epoxy that hasn't fully cured can bring on a reaction. Always wear gloves that protect the wrists as well as hands. Most gloves available to boat builders are adequate for epoxy but will not stand up to cleanup solvents such as acetone or lacquer thinner. When cleaning up, discard the thin latex gloves you used for epoxying and change to heavy, solvent-proof gloves.

There is no alternative to using proper safety gear, working as cleanly as possible and not getting epoxy on your skin. Of the two epoxy components, the hardener is the most toxic. Keep this in mind, particularly when cleaning the hardener side of your epoxy dispenser. Extreme caution should also be used when sanding partially cured epoxy surfaces, as may happen in the winter in an unheated shop. Always wear a respirator and protective clothing, even if it's only street clothes that are laundered daily and cover all parts of the body likely to come in contact with uncured epoxy. If you have a beard, a full-hood, and powered-respirator fresh-air system may be the only answer, since regular cartridge-type respirators will not seal properly over a beard. Wear eye protection at all times. Safety glasses don't always work well as many find them uncomfortable and if eyeglasses are uncomfortable, at some point you'll find yourself working without them--and that's when accidents happen. Even if you don't wear eyeglasses for vision, get yourself fitted with a proper expensive set of frames with clear lenses. Spend some money on them so you won't treat them casually and wreck them. Then wear them constantly in the shop so you get used to them. Always shower after a work session; (continued Page 14)







Never Too Young For Boating Safety

Joey Puell is a 13 year old student at Marco Island's Charter Middle School, and he has some really good reasons for wanting to enhance his boating knowledge. That's why he recently completed both the ABC and Seamanship classes. Joey suffered a propeller injury, resulting in two severe gashes on his right leg and one on his left foot. Nerves were cut and he lost feeling.



in one of his legs. For a good while, Joey had to wear a cast on the damaged leg. Now, one of his feet is not strong enough to lift up on its own; it needs to be kept in place by a permanent brace.

Because of this experience, Joey says that he will take the responsibility of "captaining a vessel" seriously. Safety will be the number one goal, and he will make sure that everyone on board is informed of what to do and what not to do while boating or in the water near a boat.

Joey also has other typical goals that motivated him and his mom and dad to enroll in MISPS courses The 13 year old knows that it will be a while before he can get in a car and run errands for his parents. He is hoping that once his family gets a boat, he will be able to get in the boat and make a grocery run to Winn Dixie, a waterfront supermarket. Now that Joey has passed the boater education course sponsored by the Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron, and as long as he has his Boating Safety Education Card ID issued by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission on board, he can absolutely do that.

When asked what the 13 year old learned in his first boating course, he talked about the rules of the road and how important it is to understand things like which boat has the right of way. He particularly liked the "around the island" trip MISPS does as an ending experience for students in the ABC class when squadron members, among other things, point out where leaving and returning changes, critical knowledge for adhering to the well-known red right return rule. Joey also enjoyed getting some beginning experiences in knot tying, and thinks the information about docking and undocking was also very important. The next MISPS class, Seamanship, Joey said, went into much more detail on all of these topics.

Joey and his parents are now members of the Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron; they looked forward to lots more learning about boating and also to enjoying the many sponsored social activities.

Meet our Mascot and Help Save Lives "Wear It" Campaign at Rose Marina

If you happen to see a magnificent Newfoundland black and white dog about the size of a small pony prancing about on Marco Island wearing her custom life jacket, do not be surprised. Lily is out there doing her job encouraging community-wide participation in the Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron's Wear It Campaign. She is, after all, the Squadron's mascot. How can you show up at this event wearing a life jacket save lives? Well, the data below shows pretty clearly that it can.

An annual survey of recreational boaters conducted by Paul Worth and Associates on behalf of the National Safe Boating Council found that the North American Safe Boating Campaign continues to have positive impact on boater behavior. Specifically:

- Boaters in locations with high campaign activity actively wear their life jackets "always or most of the time with a 90 percent confidence level."
- Boaters who are aware of the Wear It Campaign and recognize its logo come from high campaign activity locations.

This is important because the data from the U.S. Coast Guard on 2014 boating accidents shows that drowning was the cause of death in over 75% of the 610 fatalities that year. Further, 84% of those drowned in a boating accident were not wearing life jackets. So, showing up and helping to spread awareness of the Wear It Campaign may have very positive impact on your neighbors. In addition to an opportunity to meet and greet Lily, the Marco Island Sail and Power mascot, you will have a chance to see first-hand the collaboration and cooperation on behalf of many invited organizations. Last year this event had the largest number of participants in the state of Florida, and the goal this year is to do even better.
