

Time to start preparing for summer weather. We love boating in the summer season. Most of the time it is delightful to be on the water and enjoy the beautiful natural surroundings of the part of paradise that is Marco Island and the Squadron has planned many events and activities to make this a great boating summer. But don't be



complacent. Now is the time to plan ahead to maximize the joy of boating here.

Do you always check the weather and tides before departing in your vessel? Do you know what to look for in weather formations to anticipate problems and exercise caution? Do you have a plan for what to do if you are caught on the water in a storm? Do you leave a float plan with a responsible person when you head out for a cruise? Has your boat been checked to assure you are properly equipped and current for vessel safety? Are your personal flotation devices in good shape? Do you carry a spare radio? Do you follow the rule of thirds in terms of fuel when embarking on a journey? Do you know how to protect your boat when major storms or hurricanes threaten Southwest Florida? If the answer to any of these questions is 'no', we need to talk. You are not taking full advantage of the knowledge, classes and services being offered by your fellow Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron members.

Soon it will be June and our summer monsoon season will begin. Heat and humidity will build daily and generate the possibility of sudden and fast moving storms in our area. Also, the 2017 hurricane season will be underway with all the angst that the potential for damage a powerful storm can generate.

MISPS is all about boating responsibly and safely. Your fellow squadron members are some of the most experienced and knowledgeable people in the region about how to avoid, anticipate and respond to foul A significant advantage of MISPS membership is to learn from one another. Be proactive, ask others for advice, pay attention to the columns of advice prepared by our safety officer, have your vessel inspected, brush up your skills by taking a course, gather what you need to secure your boat in a storm and utilize the United States Power Squadron® on line training materials to prepare for safe boating this summer. You won't regret it. In addition, you will be protecting your investment and helping to fulfill the MISPS mission of making boating safer in and around the Marco Island area.



#### **EDUCATION OFFICER** P/C Edward Reiss, SN-IN

A great educational season is just about over. The three America's Boating Courses had turned away requests for December, January and March. Each class had about 20 students. Instructors. P/C Jim Olmes. SN, 1/Lt Kathleen Reynolds, AP, P/C Peggy Reiss, JN-IN and Lt Tom Ryan, AP are to be congratulated for helping



the students learn safe boating. As a result an extra April class is now scheduled to begin on 17 April. The experiences and talents of first time instructors Lt Nick Rago, AP and Lt Rick Kelso, AP guided the 19 students who took SEAMANSHIP with squadron members Earl Haldeman, Erich Lademann, Rebecca Puell, Stosh Kott and Karen Urso earning an S. P/C Tippy Cavanagh, SN led our sun gazers in Junior Navigation and in a few weeks the test results for JN and Piloting will identify more students with newly acquired advanced grades.

Just as important were the seminars on Weather (Rhonda Gloodt), How to use a Chart and GPS (Jim Olmes and Carl Thieme) and Partner in Command (Ted & Peggy Reiss). From my observations members of our squadron continued to learn.

For the future, we need several more instructors. Members have asked for courses on: electrical systems, communication and navigational equipment; engine maintenance and sail. Who has some experience in any of these topics? Instructor manuals are available along with prepared presentation material. Someone must know how to connect wires, or do first aid on an engine or let the wind take you toward a sunset. Related is a planned Instructor Development short course which includes each student making a one, three and five minute presentation plus preparing a one hour lesson plan. The student manual gives lots of background on teaching methods, styles and how students learn. When should we schedule a class for you?

Are you prepared to save someone's life? A free CPR and First Aid class taught by the Marco Island Fire and Rescue team is set for 19 April from 0900 to 1300. The first 15 to sign-up with me by 12 April get a seat.

The Vessel Trainer can be used almost any day. Let 1/Lt John Maciolek, AP or me know when you are interested to sign up.



#### SAFETY OFFICER Lt Edward Bauer

As the Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron's new Safety Officer I would like to ask your help in identifying issues for our squadron and ideas for future subjects for this column.



During the busy season on the Marco waterways we have all experienced numerous examples

of boaters who were operating discourteously or dangerously towards other boaters. Some may have just purchased their first boat, others have rented from the various marinas, others may be so involved with partying with their friends that they are not paying attention. Most likely they have not had the benefit of at least the America's Boating Course or similar training courses.

I have rented numerous boats over the years in a variety of marine locales, once with friends, a 50' houseboat and trailing motorized skiff for a week on Lake Powell. Training consisted of how to work the radio if we needed assistance. Nothing about the "rules of the road", hazards we might encounter, anchoring, etc.

Alternately, Susan and I rented a 45' narrowboat on the Mersey-Trent Canal in northern England. Before taking the helm we spent 4 hours of training including videos, knot tying, lock operation, safety, radio operation, canal protocol, water conditions, and an hour on the water with an instructor.


Rentals in the Marco Island area have included no instruction other than how to operate the radio and warnings not to take the boats into the Gulf.

Talking with Freedom Boat Club I learned that new members must undergo 1 ½ hours of classroom instruction and 1 ½ hours on the water to become (inshore) members. For offshore operation they must have taken the boat out 6-7 times and also receive additional training.

So how may we further our education of boaters through outreach, kids programs, speakers bureau, Vessel Safety Checks, advertisements, etc.? Could we work with the marinas and provide some basic handout that would help those renting the boat? Food for thought.

## Vessel Safety Chairman Lt Tom Ryan, AP

The Vessel Safety Check (VSC) team has examined 136 vessels to date. In March, we are starting a campaign to see if we can obtain 100% of member participation in the VSC program. These safety checks are free and a volunteer Certified Vessel Examiner will check your boat to make sure it complies with the USCG safety




requirements. We never report our results to any enforcement agency. The exam is solely for your benefit. Our squadron receives credit for every vessel checked including wave-runners, canoes and kayaks. We even receive credit if the vessel does not meet the requirements. The number of vessel safety checks is a component of our squadron evaluation. So, when one of our examiners calls you, please schedule an appointment even if you don't use your boat or it needs repair. We still provide information that is important to you. If you haven't received a call yet please contact Lt Tom Ryan, AP or one of the VSC team members to schedule an appointment.

conducted a computer session on 16 March to train the COOP Charting team how to both access all the ATON/PTON information in our data base and superimpose / view it on Google Earth.



# Cooperative Charting Chairman P/C Carl Thieme, SN

MISPS COOP Charting teams have already completed a number of resurveys for 2017. We hope to have them completed by mid-April and we also intend, over the next 2 months, to initiate new ATON/PTON surveys in area's adjacent to and south of Marco Island [Blackwater River, Port of the Islands and Everglades City].



P/C Andy Battaglia, SN and Bryan Mordecai, AP have identified significant ATON/PTON issues related to the entrance to Caxambas Pass from the Gulf. The missing ATONs and lights are scheduled to be replaced in the near future by the County thanks to Andy's persistence. Thanks Andy!

Potential areas of cooperation are being explored between MISPS and U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary [USCGA] Flotilla 95. The current focus of the talks is related to the surveying and reporting of problem ATON'S / PTON's in MISPS's Adopt a Chart Area of responsibility. The participants in these meetings were Commander Doug Bartlett and Navigator Lee Koenecke of USCGA and P/C Carl Thieme, SN and Lt Cliff Winings, SN. The USCGA in Marco Island does not currently have the personnel available to check all the ATON'S / PTON'S in our area. MISPS needs the assistance of the local USCGA to file the reports related to ATON / PTON discrepancies within the US Coast Guard Light List data base system. The US Coast Guard will not accept any discrepancy reports without verification from the local USCGA Flotillas. The USCG will then change the appropriate Light List data and hopefully forward the information to NOAA for corrective action on the appropriate Marine charts. Given this situation we have invited the current USCGA Navigator Lee Koenecke to survey with us to verify ATON/PTON issues MISPS has identified that need to be reported. Navigator Lee Koenecke will then take on full responsibility to file all the necessary reports to the USCG. Lee is checking to make sure MISPS gets credit in the USCG discrepancy report for initially identifying ATON/PTON issues. MISPS still intends to submit discrepancy reports to USPS National and District 22, NOAA, the City of Marco Island and Collier County. MISPS will maintain the comprehensive data base for all the ATON's and PTON'S in the Greater Marco Island area.

What a fantastic time we had aboard the *Coral Princess*, which was designed specially to be able to navigate the Panama Canal. I represented MISPS and traveled with my daughter Nancy. Mast was plastic straws with wooden stirrers as connectors, stay of yarn with water bottle labels as pennants, a mermaid on the bow and a Jolly Roger flag. The competition (2 men) brought their boat made of aluminum beer cans forming a round boat and it had a nice sail. Nancy's boat floated beautifully with the full 6-pack across the pool and back. One man took off his shirt and shoes and just before getting into the pool, set his boat in the water ... which immediately tipped over dumping out all the soda cans. The hostess said he'd have to recover the cans or pay for the soda. Nancy and I said our ditty, "Ahoy matey! Here's the news, having fun on a Princess cruise. Arrgghh!" She won a bottle of Champagne. 

## **March Dinner Meeting**



The 14 March dinner commenced with social hour at the M. I. Yacht Club in their downstairs bar/porch area. At the appointed time, 63 members proceeded upstairs to the dining area. Pledge of Allegiance was begun by P/Lt/C Chuck Wilson, JN and the invocation by Chaplain D/1/Lt Andrea Battaglia, SN. Cdr Rhonda Gloodt, AP called upon Lt Wanda Burson, S to introduce the speakers: Dr. Wm. Trotter and Jim Timmerman. Bridge reports were given by each officer. Dinner choices of either braised brisket of beef or potato crusted salmon, all the trimmings were served. As the coffee and chocolate lava cake ala mode were served, the evening's program was started. Dr. Trotter talked about Marco Island stormwater management and water quality observations. The city of M.I. tested canal water quality on a monthly basis until 2014. Currently it is only done on a quarterly schedule and the City subscribes to Collier County and the C.C. Pollution Control Lab for canal water sample collection and assessment. are used as indicators of fecal contamination of recreational waters throughout the world. Fecal Coliform is a primary indication of "potability, suitably for consumptions of drinking water". Proposed solution: There needs to be an extensive regrading of swales and inlet height adjustment to promote optimum levels of percolation. It is necessary to assess the effectiveness of filters on inlets and execute an effective maintenance program. There should be more rigorous compliance enforcement with the Fertilizer Ordinance and waste disposal by boats anchored in our waterways. In short, Marco needs to develop a comprehensive program for stormwater management and water quality. Jim Timmerman showed examples of the Ocean Restoration initiative: habitats are made out of fiberglass, pvc, polypropylene rope and crab trap floats. Full size units have been able to support 150,000 organisms representing 60 different marine species. A fully developed habitat is able to filter on average 35,000 gallons of seawater every day. A canal system with enough habitats could have its water filtered completely every day and contain a thriving community of stone crabs, shrimp and dozens of fish species. We thank Dr. Trotter and Jim Timmerman for speaking on an important and interesting topic.





#### **Upgraded MISPS Web Site**

If you downloaded this newsletter you had at least a glimpse of the upgraded MISPS website:

This new version of our website has a modern, responsive design that provides a cleaner look and a better viewing experience on



smartphones. For narrow displays, the information wraps to a single column that remains legible. The menu bar across the top of the page also wraps as the screen size (or viewing window) decreases. For smartphones-width displays, the menu bar disappears completely, but the menu button at the upper left remains visible with any display size.

The new website has all the information that was in the old website, but the information is re-organized under the new menu system. Part of the reorganization is that documents and external web pages all open in a new window or tab rather than the same window.

There is also some new content:

- 1) "Join Us" page with instructions and application form for joining MISPS.
- 2) "Coop Charting" page with information on MISPS Cooperative Charting project.
- 3) A link, on the "Squadron Information" menu, to a password-protected directory of squadron members showing names, email addresses and phone numbers.
- 4) A listing of upcoming courses on the "Home" page, with links to the "Boating Course" page.
- 5) The "Squadron Officers" page now shows job descriptions for the top 6 Bridge Officers and has e-mail address links in addition to phone numbers.
- 6) The recently added Condo Calendar, showing scheduled events in the condo, now has a link for smartphone users that provides a better view of the calendar than the current embedded calendar.
- 7) The Tides link on the Home page is now broken into three links direct to NOAA graphs and tables for tides at three stations near Marco. To view tides for other stations, click the "Back to Stations Listing" above any graph.


