EDUCATIONAL OFFICER D/Lt/C Ted Reiss, SN-CN

Congratulations to Meg and Bob Smith for passing the Piloting course with excellent scores.

The warm summer season is upon us. Time to put into practice all that we've learned. It is also the time to get free on the water training in your vessel. From my experience the best place to learn



how to operate a vessel or improve your skills is on the water. With 37 new members since September I hope I can help most of you. For our more seasoned members, who is ready to test for the Inland Navigator Boat Operator Certificate?

Educational schedule for the Fall and Winter is in the planning phase. Let 1st Lt John Maciolek, AP or me know what topics you want to learn. We guarantee you will learn something useful. Normal course sequence after the America's Boating Course is Seamanship, Piloting, Advanced Piloting, and the two celestial navigation courses. Should we offer a Seamanship course in November/December and again in February? You can also opt to take Piloting before Seamanship. The MISPS Roster handbook identifies elective courses we can present. Who is ready for Marine Electronics which covers basic electrical concepts? How about Engine Maintenance? Other short subjects are covered in 2-hour seminars. There are over 20 available and are listed on the United States Power Squadrons web page under the Educational Department. This is just a hint on how to find out much more about learning.

At the Fall District 22 Conference, 6 October 2017, at Punta Gorda, there will be 8 sessions or roundtables conducted to enhance your learning. The tentative topics are: Operations Training, Social Media (Facebook, etc.), Homeland Security Update, Talent Search, Educational Update from National, Dolphin Experience, Town Hall Meeting with District Commander and National Rear Commanders and an Update on Cooperative Charting. The Operations Training session is an excellent opportunity to really learn about how our organization works, who does what and why. In addition to the roundtable discussions, the conference is a great way to meet people from the other 16 squadrons who have the same interests as you. Coffee and pastries will be available prior to the sessions.

So let's continue to learn, be safe and go boating.



SAFETY OFFICER Lt Edward Bauer

In last month's *Eagle's Eye*, Charlie Gentry, JN related the story of his Blue Chip fire at sea. Through his and Marge's fast thinking, tragedy was avoided.

Another unavoidable fire related incident occurred when the aluminum fuel tank of the *Green Flash*, Roy Sander, JN & Pam



Sander, JN's boat, developed a hole on its bottom, leaking a considerable amount of fuel into the bilge. The quick response by Roy and personnel at the Rose Marina saved the day.

More than bad weather, fire is often referred to as a boater's worst enemy.

Every fire must have both a fuel source and an ignition source. That's because, when it comes to boats, fuel and ignition sources are most likely to come together in the engine room or under the cowl of an outboard.

Major issues & causes

- Marco Fire and Rescue indicated that sloppy fueling and placing the nozzle in a rod holder are major contributors.
- The majority of fuel fires come from fuel leaks due to failures of hoses or hose clamps. Wiping down hoses with a rag and smelling it can alert you to a slow leak that hasn't yet caused a serious problem. If the rag smells of gasoline or diesel, either you have a leak or the hose is old enough that it is becoming porous and needs to be replaced
- A Boat US survey determined that electrical poor wiring and shorting out –including unprotected battery terminals are the single greatest cause. Remember, 12v is different from alternating current. These higher loads create more heat where there are undersized wires, loose or corroded connections, or intermittent shorts

Preparation and avoidance

- For inboards, run your blower for minimum of 4 minutes
- Fire extinguishers readily available and full
- Practice with a fire extinguisher
- Fire suppression units
- Has your vessel had a VSC?
- Plan ahead where to cut off electric
- VHF radio to summon help







The decision was made to believe the forecast of "5 to 10 knots building to 15 knots in the late afternoon". The responsibility for deciding go/no-go is always a bit daunting but this time the weather gods smiled on our efforts.

Thanks to Mark and Lindsay McFadden we were notified of the loss of Coon Key Light, our rendezvous point, and the hazard of its stump at surface level. Five boats met 100 yds off the rusted stump and followed the ANDY B to the entrance of Dismal Key Pass and White Horse Key. Several of our people were new to boating in the Ten Thousand Islands and were happy to capture the track on their GPS. The back side of White Horse is a near perfect spot for picnics with a sand beach and enough water to permit putting the bow on the beach and a stern anchor in 6 ft. of water.

Umbrellas and shelters were welcome sanctuaries from the sun and the wind was just enough to keep the hot air and insects at bay. Eight boats brought 24 picnickers to our favorite picnic spot in the Ten Thousand Islands. As forecast, the wind picked up around 2 P.M. (4 bells in the afternoon watch). On the way back, we could not see the temporary marker on Coon Key Light and assumed it was underwater from the exceptionally high tide. Still a hazard!

It's always a pleasure to see youngsters exploring the island and the boating experience. We hope to see James and Grace (grandchildren of Lt/C Tom Morr, P) on another of our picnics.

Thanks again to the McFaddens for the heads-up on the Coon Key Light hazard.





- Make radio call on channel 16 to Coast Guard for assistance
- Throw burning materials over the side _
