

America's Boating Club - Marco Island members and their friends welcomed in the new year on 12 January with our first 2019 boating activity, a Sunset Eco - Cruise on Rookery Bay. We boarded the Good Fortune II, a thirty five passenger pontoon boat, which we privately chartered from the Conservancy of Southwest Florida. As soon as we



departed the dock we were greeted by a pod of energetic dolphins who entertained us by jumping clear out of the water, tail slapping, and later, swimming and breaching alongside of our boat.

The rest of our trip was strictly for the birds. Next up were nesting eagles, followed by nesting ospreys, flying ospreys with fish wiggling in their talons, various egrets, herons, ibises, cormorants, anhingas and pelicans. Our Conservancy naturalist guide, aptly nicknamed "Heron" provided us with fascinating background information about each bird's physiology and feeding habits.

As sunset approached the Good Fortune ll advanced upon the Rookery Island, where more than one thousand birds would roost for the night. Hundreds of birds perched shoulder to shoulder, squawking and flapping, and we viewed dozens more winging their way from the four corners of Rookery Bay to join them. As we returned to the dock at Shell Island Road at twilight, all of us were appreciative of the beautiful sights we had witnessed together.

We are truly fortunate to live in such a beautiful natural area. The Ten Thousand Islands is a treasure trove of changing landscapes, a cornucopia of aquatic and terrestrial life. Lets all of us take advantage of our opportunities to explore the beautiful environment that surrounds us. Our Boating Club is happy to facilitate such exploration by organizing cruises to many of our local islands. The next scheduled boating activity is the Cruise and Picnic to White Horse Key, to be led on February 16 by Cruise Captain Andrea Battaglia. I hope you will join us for another beautiful day on the water.

Anchors Away

Some Florida residents may recall an interesting and deadly boating accident of a decade ago. It involved two NFL players and two friends in February, fishing 50 miles offshore for amberjack. Early that morning they loaded two large coolers



with ice, drinks, food and beer. All were dressed in warm clothes, sweat suits and jackets.

At around sunset they went to pull up the anchor and head back to port, but the anchor was stuck. Someone suggested they tie the anchor line to the transom and use the boat's motor to pull it loose.

When the boat's skipper tried to thrust the boat forward, the vessel became submerged and capsized, tossing the men overboard. All four tried righting the boat by standing on one side of the overturned vessel. When that didn't work, one man swam underneath and was able to retrieve three life vests and a cushion-type flotation device.

Two days later one man was found clinging to the boat; the other three were never found. The men appear to have tried everything in their power to rescue themselves. The survivor told the investigating agency they tried retrieving and using flares, but they were wet. They tried using their cell phones, which were in plastic baggies, but there was no signal. Over the course of time, one after another became unresponsive and drifted away from the others. All appeared to have been suffering from extreme signs of hypothermia.

Florida's Fish and Wildlife investigation cited carelessness and operator inexperience as contributing factors. The combination of errors came at the time a storm front was moving in, making conditions on the water very rough. The boat's owner had more than 100 hours of boating experience but no boating education, and had been drinking.

The lead investigator said moving the anchor line to the stern of the boat, contributed to the vessel's instability and flooding when they tried to free it. He described it as a mistake that probably happens every day, but one that a more experienced boater would be aware of and could handle. He recommended cutting the line if boaters are not able to easily free their anchor. The agency advises boaters to take a boating safety course and leave a detailed float plan with friends or family.



CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR MERIT MARK RECIPIENTS!

A "merit mark" (MM) is awarded by the chief commander to a member for substantial personal effort in furthering the interest, programs and objectives of USPS, its districts and squadrons. It is a coveted award; it is by and large the only official recognition members receive for their efforts. Only one merit mark may be awarded in a year to a member, no matter how extensive the contribution. A certificate is issued, and a special insigne may be worn on USPS uniforms.

Recommendations for a merit mark are made by squadron, district, rear and vice commanders to the chief commander. Active, family and apprentice members may be recommended. When a member earns 5 Merit Marks, he or she is recognized as a Senior Member. A Senior Member is allowed to display the following mark above their insignia of grade. If a member earns 25 Merit Marks, he or she is recognized as a Life Member. A Life Member is allowed to display a mark similar to the Senior Member's mark except that the "V" is surrounded by a gold laurel wreath. 


JANUARY DINNER MEETING




