
We look forward to receiving your ideas and suggestions and 100% participation in the survey.

Thanks to great instructors the Winter courses and seminars are over. Education team consisted of: Peggy Reiss and Jeff Williams for the America's Boating Course, Gene Burson for Marine Navigation, Tippy Cavanagh for Offshore Navigation, Nick Rago

for Boat Handling, Jim Addison for Marine Electrical Systems, Carl Thieme for Charting/GPS and Rhonda Gloodt for Hurricane Preparedness. The product is many more learned boaters.

What would you like for the summer – a course or a seminar? The classroom is not shut down. What would you like for the Fall and next Winter? Since I am asking, who would like to be an instructor and share your experiences with others? You do not need to be an expert, only willing. We have material for many courses and seminars to guide you. We have an instructor development program to help if you are bashful.


Parts for our classroom vessel trainer/simulator just arrived. As soon as it is assembled and the software installed and functioning, we will let you know and begin scheduling sessions — maybe 45-50 minutes at a time. You will be able to dock a boat in various wind and current conditions, race in open water, refloat a sinking vessel etc.

National USPS continues to upgrade many courses and seminars. Weekly updates are presented on the progress. By the end of the year we should have a new Advance Marine Navigation course and a new Coastal Navigation course. New education schedule will be published in Eagle's Eye and our web site in September.

America's Boating Channel continues to have more videos, TV shows and information for a growing variety of boating activities. These are available for free on Fire Stick and Roku. Let me know your interest and I can help you get started.

Let's go boating, be safe and keep on learning.





SAFETY OFFICER Goeff Fahringer



For all our trips both big and small

I have seen over the years how sometimes we get quite lackadaisical over our pursuits and

hobbies when it comes to planning and safety. Pilots call it "deviation of normalization," a condition where we have a checklist or plan but over time we start to cut corners. We cut corners on our safety, and when nothing happens, the shortcuts become normal until **BANG**, problems do indeed crop up with results from a small inconvenience to disaster.

The Southern Boatings' December issue touched on this subject. I have taken the liberty to reproduce their information and added some points of our own. We have a lot of great trips planned for 2024, DON'T cut corners on those trips, both the small and the big ones. Safe boating as they say is "No Accident".

- **SAFETY EQUIPMENT**: Begin with a thorough inspection of safety gear. Ensure you have life jackets, flares, a first-aid kit, fire extinguishers, and a working horn or whistle onboard. Double-check that all safety equipment is up-to-date and in good condition.
- NAVIGATION SYSTEMS: Confirm that your GPS, chartplotter, and compass are functioning correctly. Update charts and navigation software as necessary.
- **ENGINE AND FUEL**: Check the engine for any signs of wear or damage. Top off fuel tanks and verify that all engine fluids are at the appropriate levels.
- **ELECTRICAL SYSTEMS**: Test all electrical systems, including lights, navigation lights, and communication devices. Carry spare batteries and be sure your radio is working well.
- **BILGE PUMPS**: Inspect bilge pumps and ensure they are in good working order. A reliable bilge pump is essential for keeping your boat dry.
- **ANCHORING GEAR**: Verify the condition of your anchor, chain, and ropes. Be certain that the windlass or manual winch works smoothly.
- MAN OVERBOARD DRILLS: We need to practice man overboard drills. Even a simple

- sunset cruise can turn deadly. DISCUSS where the life jackets are, first aid kits and the plan if someone falls overboard EVERY TIME
- **SAILS AND RIGGING**: For sailboats, check the condition of sails, lines, and rigging. Look for any signs of wear or damage and make necessary repairs or replacements.
- **PLUMBING AND WATER SYSTEMS**: Test the freshwater and plumbing systems to ensure there are no leaks or blockages. Verify that the toilet, sinks, and showers are in working order.
- PROVISIONS: Stock up on food, water, and essential supplies for your trip. Consider the duration of your cruise and pack accordingly.
- **DOCUMENTATION**: Be sure all necessary documents, such as your boating license, registration, and insurance, are up-to-date and readily accessible.
- **WEATHER FORECAST**: Check the weather forecast for your intended route and destination. Be prepared for changing conditions.
- **EMERGENCY PLAN**: Develop an emergency plan and communicate it with your crew. Ensure everyone knows the location of safety equipment and how to use it.
- FIRST AID TRAINING We can schedule a CPR/AED and First Aid Class for our members, you should take advantage of this and all training opportunities. The Coast guard, Power Squadron and many other groups offer extra training on many subjects.



March 13 Dinner Meeting

Our March 13th meeting was a celebration of St. Patty's Day with Corned Beef and Cabbage or Cod in butter/lemon sauce on the menu. As our Bailey's Irish Crème cake was being served, Don Rice and Richard Hurd from the Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 95 here in Marco gave their presentation on kayak construction and safety issues, proper kayaking technique, as well as where to kayak, training opportunities and interest groups around Marco. Don, who is nationally recognized as a Paddlecraft Oualifier for the Coast Guard and an American Canoe Association Coastal Kayaking Instructor, described the three types of kayaks – ocean, sit- inside and sit- on -top and the advantages and disadvantage of each. He explained how improper construction of many kayaks almost assure they will sink. Properly sealed flotation chambers in sit-in kayaks along with self-rescue paddle float and a pump will insure a safer trip. Of course, a proper life vest, signaling devices and handheld VHF and personal locator beacon are a must when kayaking in the backwaters. The presentation ended in a discussion on how boaters and kayakers need to respect each other out on the water and how MISPS and the USCGA can work together to promote safe boating and kayaking.

Coop Charting Team Report

Your 2024 MISPS Coop Charting team has been hard at work, completing surveys on 220 of the 325 ATONS in Marco Island, Isle of Capri, Everglade City, Port of the Everglades, and Blackwater River waterways. The remaining surveys will be wrapped up in early April. The information gathered is comprised of the exact GPS location, photographs of both sides of each marker and documentation as to its condition: damaged, leaning, missing parts, unreadable, or simply missing altogether. These are all entered into a database noting each ATON's position and how its location differs from the published charts. This information is published on the "Aids to Navigation" page of our website. Reports will be provided to the US Coast Guard, to Collier County Coastal Zone Management and to Marco Island City; each of these organizations has responsibility for maintaining specific markers in these waterways. Each year numerous markers are damaged or destroyed, some by boaters, but mostly by wind and waves. Despite significant annual maintenance by the responsible organizations, the work is never complete. Nearly 30% of the markers currently need repair or replacement and more than 15% are charted at a position more than 150 feet from their actual location.






Boat Around Marco March 20,2024









Crowdsourcing is the collective efforts of a community to gather data. Anyone enthusiastic about the ocean can participate in collecting data about our seafloor. Bathymetry focuses on measuring and mapping the topography of the ocean floor. It is the study of underwater depths, contours and features, providing crucial insights into seafloor formations such as mountains, canyons and ridges.
