GET INSPECTED

One of the nice things about driving a car is when something goes wrong, flat tire, out of fuel, or engine quits, you can just pull over to the side of the road and safely get help. That

scenario is not so easy to do when boating. Something as simple as running out of fuel or a simple medical emergency can turn life threatening, or at the least ruin what should have been a great day on the water.

Many boaters don't know that the coast guard has a list of requirements that boaters must have on their boats, and it's much more than a life jacket and flares. But what is required for different size boats? And is there any way a boater can find out that he or she is really in compliance if law enforcement should ever stop them to conduct an inspection? Or worse case someone is injured on your boat and the



equipment you should have had to help was missing. Luckily, in our area we have several Coast Guard approved vessel examiners — individuals who are available to come to your boat's location and conduct a complete vessel safety check. A smart boater will always want to be a safer, more knowledgeable boater and have the safest vessel he or she can.

Let's look over the minimum requirements for recreational boats. This is the current up-to-date list of the U.S Coast Guard's minimum safety requirements for recreational boats with sizes of up to 65 ft (19.8m) in size. These requirements detail what boating safety equipment must be present on board, and other necessary features that must be installed to comply with federal laws.

U.S. COAST GUARD MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR RECREATIONAL BOATS

Personal Flotation Devices

For boats smaller than 16 ft (4.9m): One approved Type I, II, III or V (must be worn) PFD for each person on board or being towed on water skis, tubes, etc.

For boats sized between than 16 ft and 65.6 ft (20m): One approved Type I, II or III PFD for each person on board or being towed on water skis, etc.; and one throwable Type IV device. (A type V PFD may be used in lieu of any wearable PFD if approved for the activity in which the boat is being used. A TYPE V HYBRID MUST be worn to be legal.)

Note: Check state laws for PFD wearing requirements for children and for certain watercraft and sports. Federal Regulations mandate that states without child life jacket laws require that youths under 13 wear an approved PFD whenever a recreational boat is underway, unless below decks or in a closed cabin. States with existing regulations are not required to alter their status. Florida DOES have a state child life jacket law. Children under 6 years of age must wear a USCG-approved PFD at all times while on any vessel less than 26 feet in length that is underway upon Florida waters.

Bells and Whistles

For all boats smaller than 65.6 ft (20m): Every vessel less than 65.6 ft. (20 meters) in length must carry an efficient sound producing device.

For boats larger than 65.6 ft: On Federally

controlled waters, every vessel 65.6 ft. (20 meters) or larger in length must carry a whistle and a bell. They must be audible for 1 nautical mile.

Visual Distress Signals

These visual distress signal requirements only apply for coastal waters, the Great Lakes and U.S. owned boats on the high seas.

For boats smaller than 16 ft (4.9m): They are required to carry approved visual distress signals for night-time use.

For boats above 16 ft but no greater than 65.6 ft: They must carry approved visual distress signals for both daytime and night-time use.

Fire Extinguishers

For boats up to 26 ft (7.9m): One B-I type approved hand portable fire extinguisher. (Not required on outboard motorboats less than 26 ft in length if the construction of the motorboat is such that it does not permit the entrapment of explosive or flammable gases or vapors, and if fuel tanks are not permanently installed.)

For boats between 26 ft and 40 ft (12.2m): Two B-I type OR one B-II type approved portable fire extinguishers.

For boats between 40 ft and 65.6 ft: Three B-I type OR one B-I type PLUS one B-II type approved portable fire extinguishers are required.

Note: When a fixed fire extinguishing system is installed in machinery spaces it will replace one B-I portable fire extinguisher.

Ventilation

Coast Guard requirements on ventilation differ depending on the date your boat was manufactured. The requirements don't change depending on the size of your vessel, just the date it was built.

Boats built on or after 8/1/1980: At least two ventilation ducts capable of efficiently ventilating every closed compartment that contains a gasoline engine and/or tank, except those having permanently installed tanks that vent outside of the boat and which contain no unprotected electrical devices.

Engine compartments containing a gasoline engine with a cranking motor are additionally required to contain power operated exhaust blowers that can be controlled from the instrument panel.

Boats built before 8/1/1980: At least two ventilation

ducts fitted with cowls (or their equivalent) for the purpose of efficiently and properly ventilating the bilges of every closed engine and fuel tank compartment using gasoline as fuel or other fuels having a flashpoint of 110 degrees or less. This applies to boats constructed or decked over after April 25, 1940.

Back Fire Flame Arrestor

One approved device on each carburetor of all gasoline engines installed after April 25, 1940, except for outboard motors. This regulation applies to all recreational boats.

Navigation Rulebooks

All boats over 40 ft in length must carry an up to date copy of the ISDOT ISCG International – Inland Navigational Rules book on board.

Other Things To Consider

It's worth noting that some states have requirements in addition to the federal requirements. Make sure that you check your state's boating laws for additional requirements. While these aren't always mandatory, we've put together a short list of things that are essential to keep aboard, no matter what size your boat is.

First Aid Kit

A first aid kit should be kept on board. Make sure it has a selection of band aids and bandages, as well as range of medication.

Tools

Keeping tools on your boat can help you out in a bind. Don't rely on pocket knives and multi-tools; having the right tool for the job will make minor repairs much easier.

VHF Radio

No boat should leave the marina without some kind of practical communication device. While some boaters are confident enough to leave with just a cell phone, a portable VHF radio will be of far more use in an emergency.

So, now knowing this, we as safe boaters, should be conducting our own safety checks, making sure of our boats' compliance and we need to have this done as Power Squadron members. As power squadron members we have our own vessel examiners.

Contact Jin Addison and he will schedule you with one of them for an official inspection.

As a power squadron member, a safety inspection is not mandatory. But I can tell you as a career law enforcement officer and prior Sheriff's Office marine patrol auxiliary captain, when your boat is stopped by law enforcement, a safety inspection sticker already sets the mood that you are a trained, educated and safe boater. And more good news, these inspections are FREE. And if your boat doesn't pass the inspection, the inspector will give you all the information you need so if you decide to call the inspector back for a second FREE inspection; this time your boat will pass with flying colors!

One final thing, consider taking a CPR/AED First Aid class, we are doing these classes every month through May. Next month we will talk about the need for a VHF radio on your boat and the importance of monitoring Channel 16. Remember safe boating is NO ACCIDENT.

Brief Explanation of VSC Required Items:

- ☐ 1. NUMBERING: The boat's registration number must be permanently attached to each side of the forward half of the boat. Characters must be plain, vertical, block style, not less than three (3) inches high, and in a color contrasting with the background. A space or hyphen must separate the letters from the numbers. Place State validation sticker according to State policy. (e.g. FL 1234 AH or FL-4234-AB)
- ☐ 2. REGISTRATION/DOCUMENTATION: Registration or Documentation papers must be on board and available. Documentation numbers must be permanently marked on a visible part of the interior structure. The documented boat's name and Hailing Port must be displayed on the exterior hull in letters not less than 4 inches in height.
- □ 3. PERSONAL FLOTATION DEVICES (PFDs): Acceptable PFDs (as known as Life Jackets) must be U.S. Coast Guard approved and in good, serviceable condition. A wearable PFD of suitable size is required for each person on the boat. Children must have properly fitted PFDs designed for children. Wearable PFDs shall be "readily accessible" Boats/rowboats 16 feet or longer, (except canoes and kayaks) must have one Type IV (throwable) device, which shall be "immediately available". PFDs shall NOT be stored in unopened plastic packaging. For Personal Watercraft riders, the PFD must be worn. An impact rating is recommended, but not required.
- ☐ 4. VISUAL DISTRESS SIGNALS: Recreational boats 16 feet and over used on coast waters or Great Lakes are required to carry a minimum of either 1) three day and three night pyrotechnic devices., 2) one day non-pyrotechnic device (flag) and one night non-pyrotechnic device (auto SOS light) or 3) a combination of 1) and 2). Recreational boats less than 16 feet on coastal waters or the Great Lakes need only carry night visual distress signals when operating from sunset to sunrise.

It is recommended, but not required, that boats operating on inland waters should have some means of signaling a suitable day and night distress signal. The number and type of signals is best judged by considering conditions under which the boat will be operating.

□ 5. FIRE EXTINGUISHERS: Fire extinguishers are required if one of the following conditions exist: 1) Inboard engine(s); 2) Double bottom hulls not completely sealed or not completely filled with floatation materials; 3) Closed living space; 4) Closed stowage compartments that contain flammable materials; or 5) Permanently installed fuel tanks. Recreational boats less than 26 feet, and propelled by outboard motors are NOT required to have fire extinguishers unless one or more of the conditions (2-5) listed above applies. NOTE: Fire extinguishers must be readily accessible and verified as serviceable.

- G. VENTILATION: Boats with gasoline engines in closed compartments, built after 1 August 1980 must have a powered ventilation system. Those built prior to that date must have neutral or powered ventilation. Boats with closed fuel tank compartments built after 1 August 1978 must meet requirements by displaying a "certificate of compliance." Boats built before that date must have either natural or powered ventilation in the fuel tank compartment.
- 7. BACKFIRE FLAME ARRESTER: All gasoline powered inboard/outboard or inboard motor boats must be equipped with an approved backfire flame control device.
- 8. SOUND PRODUCING DEVICES: To comply with Navigation Rules and for distress signaling purposes all boats must carry a sound producing device (whistle, horn, siren, etc.) capable of a 4-second blast audible for ½ mile.
- 9. NAVIGATION LIGHTS: All boats must be able to display navigation lights between sunset and sunrise and in conditions of reduced visibility. Boats 16 feet or more in length must have properly installed, working navigation lights and an all-around anchor light capable of being lit independently from the red/green/white "running lights.
- **10. POLLUTION PLACARD:** Boats 26 feet and over with a machinery compartment must display an oily waste "pollution" placard.
- ☐ 11. MARPOL TRASH PLACARD: Boats 26 feet and over in length, operating in U.S. navigable waters, must display a "MARPOL" trash placard. Oceangoing boats 40 feet and over must also have a written trash disposal plan available.
- **12. MARINE SANITATION DEVICE:** Any installed toilet must be a Coast Guard approved device. Overboard discharge outlets must be capable of being sealed.
- **13. NAVIGATION RULES:** Boats 39.4 feet and over, operating on "inland" water rules, must have on board a current copy of Navigation Rules. An electronic version of the Navigation Rules is acceptable.
- 14. STATE AND LOCAL REQUIREMENTS: These requirements must be met before the "Vessel Safety Check" decal can be awarded. A boat must meet the requirements of the state in which it is being examined.
- ☐ 15. Engine Cut Off Switch (ECOS): Required on all vessels <26 feet manufactured after 12/2019; must produce lanyard during VSC. All PWCs require self-circling or kill switch mechanisms. If installed a self-circling or kill switch mechanism must be in proper working order.

RECOMMENDED AND DISCUSSION ITEMS: (Not required for the award of the "Vessel Safety Check" decal.) For the very best boaters, we recommend those additional items. Meeting these requirements reflects your concern for Boating Safety.

I. Marine Radio (MMSI/EPIRB/PLB) - Operators should get an MMSI number or update it with contact or vessel information changes. (FCC, BoatUS, US Power Squadrons, Sea Tow, or Shine Micro Inc.) EPIRB or PLB registration is updated with NOAA.

VIII. Over all Vessel Conditions as applies

- a. Deck free of hazards and clean bilge The boat should be free from fire hazards, in good overall condition, with bilges reasonably clean and visible hull structure generally sound. The use of automobile parts on boat engines is not acceptable. The engine horsepower should not exceed that shown on the capacity plate.
- b. Electrical Systems The electrical system should be protected by fuses or manual circuit breakers. Switches and fuse panels should be protected from rain or water spray. Wiring should be in good condition, properly installed and with no exposed areas or deteriorated insulation. Batteries should be secured and the positive terminal (some states require both) covered to prevent accidental arching. Boats with outboard engine(s) are only exempt from this requirement if the battery is part of the outboard engine.
- c. Fuel Systems Portable fuel tanks (normally 7 gallons capacity or less) should be constructed of non-breakable material and free of corrosion and leaks. All vents should be capable of being closed. The tank should be secured and have a vapor-tight, leak-proof cap. Each permanent fuel tank should be properly vented. Discuss fuel management.
- **d. Galley and Heating Systems** System and fuel tanks should be properly secured with no flammable materials nearby.
- **Person in the water *PIW) kit consists of one extra wearable PFD and a throwable type IV PFD with line.






