They photographed and noted the condition of 59 ATONs in Caxambas Bay, Caxambas Channel, Horrs Island Channel and the Big Marco River south of Goodland Bridge. Other ABC-MI teams will be surveying the remaining 265 ATONs in our area over the next two months. Results will be posted on the Aids to Navigation page of our website and reported to the agencies responsible for maintenance.

Boating Education Updates

Earth is home to two North Poles: the geographic North Pole and the magnetic North Pole. The northernmost point on the Earth's

surface is "True North" and is located at 90° North Latitude. The Earth's magnetic North Pole is the focus of the Earth's magnetic field and is the point that traditional magnetic compasses point to. The magnetic North Pole is currently located in the Canadian Arctic approximately 82.7° North and 114.2° West and is travelling toward the northern coast of Siberia. We have learned in our Marine Navigation courses that the difference between True North and Magnetic North is called "Variation", can be found on the Compass Rose on nautical charts and is vitally important information for successful navigation. We also know that the location of Magnetic North changes over time.

Earth's magnetic field is generated by molten iron in its outer core. The flow of this liquid iron is what causes the change in the location of the planet's Magnetic North. While we have known for a long time that the location of magnetic north shifts over



time, what's different in more recent years is how quickly this shift is happening. From 1999 to 2005, Earth's magnetic north pole went from shifting 9 miles at most each year to as much as 37 miles in a year.

Scientists studied over 20 years of satellite data and discovered that the position of the north magnetic pole has been largely determined by two large-scale lobes of magnetic flux on the core—mantle boundary under Canada and Siberia.

Between 1970 and 1999, the flow of molten, magnetic material in Earth's outer core changed. Because of these changes, the researchers say, the magnetic blob lurking beneath Canada slowly elongated in the early aughts, weakening the

corresponding magnetic intensity on Earth's surface.

Eventually, the blob of molten material beneath

Canada split in two and the stronger one slowly shifted toward the blob beneath Siberia. This spurred the magnetic north pole to slip closer and closer to Siberia, where the magnetic intensity was stronger.

In 2017, the magnetic north pole fell within 240 miles of the geographic north pole. The movement has been so rapid that the British Geological Survey and U.S. National Geophysical Data Center, which update the World's Magnetic Model, had to accelerate their process in order to keep up.

The scientists generated a series of models of Earth's core to understand how it might move in the future. Predictions are that the

pole will continue to move towards Siberia. These shifts have major consequences for global navigation systems. Anything or anyone that uses a compass is impacted by this magnetic game of tug-o-war.

COLORS AND LOOPS

Naaaa this isn't art class, it's situational awareness and how we can be safer by being more aware of our surroundings, and how to deal with a potential threat. I just did this

situational awareness presentation on February 11th and we are doing it again at our training center on March 11th. Law enforcement officers and SWAT team members have a saying, "Your body can't go where your mind hasn't been." What does that mean? It's quite simple really. If you haven't thought out a problem in your mind, did some visualization on how you would handle the problem and worked out a plan; chances are you will be what we call a deer in the headlights, frozen in place when the unexpected occurs.


Have you even thought, "what would I do" if you were pumping gas and an armed criminal came up to to you and demanded your keys and car? Here's my plan: first, I always take my keys with me when I stop to pump gas, and I often lock my car at the pump. If someone comes up to me and demands my car, I'll throw the keys on the ground and quickly walk away. Now, the carjacker has to make a choice: grab the keys and take your car, which is what he wanted, or follow you across the parking lot. Now, take a minute to visualize yourself being approached. Take the keys out of your pocket or purse, throw them on the ground in front of the carjacker, turn, and quickly walk away towards the front door of the gas station. Then, go inside.

OK what's the deal with colors and loops? Loops first, or more specifically the OODA loop. The OODA loop is Observe, Orientate, Decide and Act. Look at the above scenario: The carjacker observed you, started to orient himself towards you, decided whether to steal your car and perhaps force you into the car, and then acted. By throwing the keys on the ground, you disrupted the robbers' OODA loop and gave yourself an opportunity to escape, you sent him back to decide. Law enforcement officers training at the range are taught when faced with a threat to draw their weapons and step to the left or right. Why? Stepping to the right or left disrupts the shooter's OODA loop, forcing them to reorient, decide, and act

all over again. Working through scenarios and visualizing problems gives you a plan and gets you moving. A good friend of mine, Sgt Mark Huffer with the Marco Island police department, has a story he loves to tell. Several years ago his brother was in California and was accosted by some possible muggers threatening him. Mark's brother started to do sign language with his hands, really just making motions with his hands and not speaking. That screwed up the muggers' OODA loop so badly they just quit and walked away.

So, what's up with colors? It's the "color" of your condition. You typically have four colors of condition: white, yellow, orange, and red.

- White = relaxed and unaware,
- Yellow = relaxed and aware,
- Orange = aware of potential threat and
- Red = confirmed threat and ready to act.



White is what you should be at home relaxing or even better asleep, never out in public. But we have all seen the videos of people texting and walking into telephone poles, texting while driving, and wearing earphones while driving or riding a bike.

Yellow is your safe color, allowing you to be relaxed and enjoy your day while still being aware of your surroundings.

Orange is when you feel a threat is occurring.

Red is when you confirm a threat and decide to act. You use these colors every day and don't even realize it. Want an example? Here's one, driving. You're driving on 951, hopefully in condition yellow not white, you're relaxed but aware of the traffic around you. Suddenly, a car coming from an intersection on your right runs a red light and turns into your lane, making you aware of a potential threat and changing to orange. If the driver accelerates and speeds away, you return to yellow. If the driver swerves close to you, you switch to red, braking or changing lanes, then drop back down to yellow. The

situational awareness part of this is to develop the habit of assessing your current state of alertness.

We are fortunate to reside in a county, a community that compared to many areas of our state and country is exceptionally secure; with highly skilled and professional law enforcement agencies protecting us. But when you leave your neighborhoods and gated communities and head out into the world, the environment changes; you never know what is happening outside the safety of our own neighborhoods.

If you tend to be that head-in-the-clouds person, in a "condition white" state of awareness, you are just setting yourself up for potential problems.

We need to be aware of our surroundings and what is happening around us. I am not talking about being paranoid, just being aware. I have observed and apprehended criminals my whole adult life. Criminals are predators just like coyotes. Coyotes watch a herd of deer looking for the weakest deer. Criminals watch for people who are distracted and unaware of their surroundings. How do you carry yourself? Do you walk with confidence, upright and looking at your surroundings? Or do you keep in a shell, shoulders hunched, looking at the ground or

even worse, lost in your phones screen? Project self-assurance and practice active awareness until it becomes second nature, and before long, you will be in a nice, bright condition yellow..
