Avoid lightning strikes on the water

Lightning strikes kill more people in the United States in a year than tornadoes, and boaters are particularly vulnerable. You can

stay safe on and off the water by learning more about lightning safety.

Many people wait far too long to seek shelter when thunderstorms threaten. Unfortunately, this delayed response leads to many lightning deaths and injuries in the U.S.

Lightning dangers for boaters

A boat is often the tallest object in a large open space and can be a dangerous place during a thunderstorm.

On the water, a direct lightning strike can damage or destroy vessels, overload navigational and other electronic systems, and electrocute crew and passengers.

Always check weather forecasts before going out on your boat and be aware of any changes in forecast while on the water.

Let's consider a few scenarios:

Lightning strikes your boat's ungrounded radio antenna. The metal antenna carries the electrical charge to the radio, which doesn't have a good conductive path into the water. Your hand is on the radio or on metal connected to the radio, and your feet are on a wet surface, which is in contact with metal that extends through the hull of the boat to the water. As a result, your body may then become the best conductor for the electrical charge.

Lightning strikes your sailboat's mast. The electrical current follows the mast or wire rope to your hands, through your body to the wet surface, and through the hull to the water.

Lightning strikes you while you're operating a motorboat. The lightning passes through your body to the motor, then to the water.

Lightning strikes the graphite fishing rod (a good conductor) that you're holding. You're sitting in an aluminum or fiberglass rowboat. The electrical charge passes through the rod, your body, and the

boat to the water.

In all four examples, you could be seriously injured or killed.

You don't even need to touch the components struck by lightning. You could get hit by a side flash, which occurs when the electrical charge jumps from one component to another seeking a better path to ground.

Lightning strikes have such a high voltage that even non-conductive materials can become conductors. If these massive voltages start to travel through a boat's structures—say, through its mast—and meet with high resistance (i.e., the hull skin), the current discharge could blow a hole in the non-conductive barrier to reach ground.

Even though your boat may never be hit by lightning, don't play the odds. If lightning strikes your boat, it could be devastating. Don't take a chance; protect yourself. If you are in a small boat and close to shore when a thunderstorm approaches, get to shore and off the water immediately. Better yet, don't go out if thunderstorms are predicted.

Lightning safety on the water

What do you do if a storm pops up while you are miles offshore?

- Keep away from metal objects. You could be electrocuted by touching them during a direct hit.
- Always wear a life jacket. If lightning strikes you, you could lose consciousness and fall overboard.
- Stay low and in the center of the boat.
- Do not touch water as water is an excellent conductor of electricity.
- Turn off electronics on any unnecessary electronic devices to prevent damage from a power surge
- Stay tuned to NOAA weather radio for the latest warnings and watches.

When it comes to lightning safety, try to follow this simple credo: When thunder roars, go indoors. –*Al Ponzio*.

COURTESY AND GUIDELINES

It seems our life from childhood to our senior years is full of rules. You might not know that there are 199

Florida statutes involving driving, 40 Florida statutes involving boating, and 20 Florida statutes involving bicycles. I would bet the best Florida Super Trooper can't recite all of them. I have found there are some rules that seem to come up more commonly as an issue in our lives. Let's look at some of those rules, or in this case guidelines, and the idea of showing some basic courtesy when interacting with others. Some guidelines to live by involving three modes of transportation I am very familiar with. What I am talking about here is driving, boating, and biking, the pedal kind of biking.

In our area of America, we are blessed with wellmaintained roads, normally clear weather, and, for the most part, well identified and marked roadways. We are also an area with traffic congestion that varies greatly by the season of the year. Add to that, out of the area drivers constantly distracted by things that you just must look at, "Hey, a pelican" and "Look at that view!" Or just trying to find that location on a phone or car map leads to doing three (or more) things at once. You remember when you first showed up down here and realized what a fantastic place this is, a little patience for our visitors might be warranted as they are experiencing the same "WOW, we all did. And to our visitors, please realize most of us are working during the day, so again, staying in the right lane when you are looking around is very much appreciated.

DRIVING. Let's discuss some of the basics of driving and courtesy: stopping at stop signs, turning correctly at 4 lane intersections, (think Collier and Elkham and Collier and Barfield), and my favorite, as I just mentioned, getting out of the left lane. In the Situational Awareness PowerPoint, I talk about road rage. One good rule in driving is to remember it's not a race: you're not going to win anything by being first. And staying out of the left lane goes a long way in not making you a trigger for road rage. Being a

courteous driver also goes a long way in keeping both your blood pressure down as well as the drivers' around you.

As I mentioned, at STOP signs, yeah really stop and look around. Parking lots are a big problem. Again – slow down and take a second look. Many accidents occur when a car is backing up. The key is to slow down and take a second look. Also, keeping your head on a swivel and looking past the car just ahead of you in traffic is also a great idea. In evasive/defensive driver training, you are always told to look for brake lights several cars ahead of you and to realize the cars just ahead of you will be reacting to those brake lights, so SLOW DOWN now. Make it a habit to really slow down and look around at yield intersections and roundabouts. Not long ago, I was on Yellowbird heading to Collier, and there were no other cars in that roundabout. At the last second, I caught a road bike rider with no lights on the bike (more on that later) coming north on 6th Avenue, running at least 15 MPH. He crossed right in front of me and continued north on 6th Ave - that was a close one.

When turning left from an inside lane, you should always complete the turn while staying in the inside lane. Unless you're driving an 18-wheeler there is no reason to swing right into the outside (right) lane. When turning right in the outside lane, stay in that right outside lane; resist the urge to drift into the other turn lanes.

One last thing, golf carts. Golf carts are what I drive on the fairway at a golf course. On our roads, they are street-legal licensed motor vehicles. These vehicles are a plus for our island, less noisy and environmentally friendly, and frankly, they look like fun. Our roadways are marked 25 MPH, 30 MPH, and 35MPH. Is it going to kill us to do 30MPH for the 6 blocks before we turn off traveling behind a golf cart? Relax. And to those golf cart drivers, look, we get it, it's nice to have the open-air freedom and view, but look in the mirror. If there is a line of cars behind you, maybe a short pullover to the curb to let the line go by might be a nice thing to do.

Bottom line, seriously, slow down, and don't get distracted. Here's an idea: set a daily goal to improve an aspect of your driving behavior. It's fun, and I actually do this! See how many drivers you let back out of a parking place, go ahead of you, and wave to let them turn left and let into traffic on any given day.

It might be fun to just be friendly.



BICYCLES, from a driver's point of view, are another sometimes annoying thing to deal with. But many of us ride for our health or for an alternate means of local transportation. Our island is a very bicycle-friendly island, but there is a right way and a wrong way to bike on our island. Bike riders are subject to the same rules as drivers. One big point is to ride with traffic, never against the traffic direction. If there is a bike lane, please use it and single file is just smart. Vehicle drivers need to know that if there is no bike lane, then the roadway is now a multi-use lane. And realize bike riders are constantly dodging debris from broken glass to dropped landscaping, so a move into the driving lane and back is just trying not to lose a tire or your upright position. Drivers, our island has wonderful multi-use sidewalks, but any bicyclist riding at speed must be in a bike lane or traffic lane or risk a collision with cars in driveways, intersections, and other people using the sidewalks.

Bikers BE VISIBLE! I ride a lot on the island. I have a flashing white light facing the front, a red flashing light under my seat facing the rear, and another flashing light on the back of my helmet. Plus, I wear orange or yellow, fluorescent shirts; MORE IS BETTER. And wear a helmet. I have dumped my own bike several times over the years, a "brain-bucket" saved me for sure.

I wanted to get an expert's opinion, so I reached out to Matt Walthour, the owner of the Island Bike Shop at 1095 Bald Eagle Drive and asked Matt his views on riding on Marco.

MATT: I believe something that is overlooked by a

lot of bicyclists is riding in the direction of traffic, either while you are on the road or one of the many multi-use pathways. Bike with the flow of traffic!! I advise all my renters and even folks that purchase new bikes on the same point: to ride with the flow of traffic. I realize it is not always the most convenient thing to do, but it sure is the safest, and it's the law (on the road, anyway). I tell people that are "serious" road riders, that you have to get up early in the morning if you want to ride in the street not battle traffic. I advise most people to stay on the sidewalks or multi-use pathways as best they can. The bike light aspect is very important. I always keep my lights on my bike even during the day. There are a lot of lights we sell that are daytime visible, which is very important with all the distractions on the road these days, from texting and people from out of state or country not knowing where they are. So, any visibility is better, just like you said. I tell people that I am lit up like Studio 54 -unfortunately, not many people get the reference.

Personally, when I am riding and I must be in the street, I always use hand signals to let drivers know my intentions. Even if I am with other riders, I let them know what direction we may be turning, or I signal if there is debris or a pothole on the ground, or when I am slowing. etc. I also believe bells or horns are important on a bike, and I have them on all my rentals. Now, granted, people with headphones on are oblivious, but it is just a courtesy thing to let people know you are approaching. A lot of the time when you say, "on your left" or "on your right," they go in that direction, so hitting that bell or horn early gives them enough time to react properly. You personally must be the one in charge of your biking. At our shop, we have a great bike lane map and we do offer a lot of great riding suggestions, whether it's for a family, a solo rider, or people who just want to "check" the island out.

At the end of the day, it's all about courtesy. None of us are Lance Armstrong riding in the Tour de France, so there is no reason to cut in and out of traffic, ignore red lights and stop signs, or unnecessarily block traffic. Give the drivers a break. Drivers think about this, a person on a bike is one less

vehicle you need to deal with. Give them some space and be glad someone's out there having fun. You should join us!



BOATERS, I have spent many years going out of the Marco River and around our area by boat, and I am constantly amazed by the things I see on the water. It's an interesting fact that you cannot legally drive a car without going through training and qualifying for a driver's license. But anyone born before Jan 1, 1988 can just run that boat without any training at all. All others require the Boating Safety Education ID card, but there are no on-the-water training requirements. There are many rules of the road that boaters really need to know. First let's look at going in the right direction and that direction's location. For you untrained boaters, those red and green panel-like things on the top of poles in the water are not left-over Christmas decorations. They are there to tell you where you should be in the waterway you are in, depending on the direction you are going. You really should understand aids to navigation. Also, people have the misconception that they only must be concerned with their wake in a no wake zone. In fact, you could be criminally or civilly responsible for your wake and any damage that you cause. Florida statute 327.33 Reckless or Careless Operation of a Vessel is an interesting read. Again, courtesy comes into play. Consider the impact your wake has on the other boats nearby, and adjust your speed/course accordingly.

Also knowing the water and weather is a wise thing to do. Our offshore waters are shallow, so storms and the resulting waves can come up quickly. When there is a tide combined with a wind coming from the opposite direction, the Marco River entrance can also have waves build to a dangerous height.

Lucky for us, our organization offers classes to make you a better boater. Americas Boating Club, the Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron, has a training center located in the Speakeasy Plaza, 1114 N. Collier Blvd. marcoboatingclub.org. Contact the educational officer, Jeff Williams, at jeffwilliams125@gmail.com, to discuss the courses offered. The Marco Island Sail and Power Squadron is a fantastic club; consider joining it for both the camaraderie and to become a better boater.

So, the message is that life is short, slow down and relax. Driving, biking, boating, and our other outdoor pursuits should be fun, or at least not stressful; we get enough stress from other areas. And show a little courtesy, say HI to people. The reactions and facial expressions from the people you are nice to are rewarding, and frankly, the occasional looks of amazement are funny when you do something nice.



Please welcome new members Howie and Ann Vreeland. They are from Bryan Ohio.




Their boating experience has been limited to fresh water lakes in Indiana and Michigan.

They are snowbirds and will return to Ohio in mid April but are looking forward to next season and spending more time on the water






