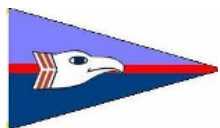

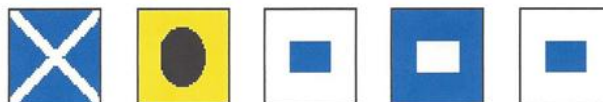

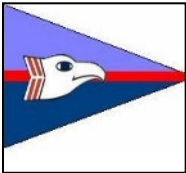

See and Be Seen with AIS

What is AIS? At its core, AIS stands for Automatic Identification System. It is an automated tracking system used by ships and vessel traffic services

to identify and locate vessels by electronically exchanging data with other nearby ships, AIS coast stations, and satellites.

Think of it as **air traffic control for the ocean**, but instead of relying entirely on a central controller, the ships talk directly to each other.

How does it work? AIS operates in the VHF maritime mobile band. A ship’s AIS unit automatically and continuously transmits data over these radio frequencies.

Any other vessel or shore station equipped with an AIS receiver within range can pick up that signal and display the ship's information directly on their electronic chart plotter, radar screen, or computer.

Why is it Important? Before AIS, mariners only had **marine radar** to see other ships at night or in thick fog. While radar is excellent, it has major limitations: it can be blocked by islands or heavy rain, it doesn't tell you the name of the ship you are looking at, and it can't tell you if a massive vessel is hiding just around a bend in a river.

AIS solves this. Because it uses VHF radio waves, it can "see" around bends and behind small islands. By providing the exact name and course of an oncoming vessel, a captain can pick up the VHF marine radio, call the other ship directly by name (e.g., "Cargo

Ship Ocean Titan, this is the sailing vessel Odyssey..."), and safely arrange how they will pass each other.

With AIS marine electronics onboard, you can identify potential dangers and quickly make decisions on the water. Many systems share your boat's information with other boats so they can also make better, safer boating decisions.

Many boaters have implemented the AIS on their boats. It is one of the best safety systems ever introduced to the boating community.

U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) uses AIS to deliver all sorts of essential information. The USCG leverages AIS as a core component of its modern maritime operations. While originally designed primarily as a ship-to-ship collision avoidance tool, the Coast Guard has expanded its use across a massive infrastructure known as the **Nationwide Automatic Identification System (NAIS)**.

Through a network of land, sea, and space-based receivers, the USCG uses AIS for four primary functions:

1. Maritime Domain Awareness (MDA) & Security

The Coast Guard uses AIS to build a real-time "Common Operational Picture" of U.S. waterways. NAIS integrates roughly 134 shore-based sites and satellite feeds to receive over 120 million messages a day. This data allows the USCG to track the identity, speed, course, and type of large commercial and passenger vessels approaching or operating in U.S. ports.

The USCG actively monitors vessels to ensure they are keeping their AIS active and accurate. Turning off an AIS transponder (for instance, hiding a "secret fishing spot" or engaging in illicit activity) is a regulatory violation. The Coast Guard pursues steep civil penalties against captains who deactivate their systems while underway.

2. Vessel Traffic Services (VTS)

In busy or treacherous waterways—like the Mississippi River, Puget Sound, or major harbor entrances—the Coast Guard operates VTS centers (essentially air traffic control for ships).

- Watch standers combine AIS data with marine radar to manage traffic flow, prevent collisions, and coordinate safe passings.

- Because radar only shows a blip, AIS provides critical context, such as the exact name of a vessel, its dimensions, and whether it is pushing a massive barge tow.

3. Digital Aids to Navigation (ATONs)

One of the most innovative ways the Coast Guard uses AIS is to broadcast the positions of buoys, beacons, and hazards directly onto a mariner's electronic chart or radar display. They categorize these into three types:

- **Real AIS ATON:** A physical buoy or tower that has an actual AIS transmitter bolted to it, broadcasting its exact GPS position.
- **Synthetic AIS ATON:** A physical buoy that doesn't have its own transmitter. Instead, a USCG shore station broadcasts its position, superimposing the digital marker exactly over the physical buoy's location.
- **Virtual AIS ATON (V-AIS):** A purely digital marker broadcasted by the USCG where no physical buoy exists. The Coast Guard uses virtual ATONs to instantly mark a newly discovered shipwreck, dynamic shoaling, or ice hazards before a physical buoy can be deployed. They are also used in areas where seasonal sea ice would sweep physical buoys away.

4. Search and Rescue (SAR)

When a vessel is in distress, time is everything. The Coast Guard relies on historical and real-time AIS data to rapidly coordinate rescue efforts.

- **Pinpointing Last Known Positions:** If a ship sinks or loses power, its last broadcast AIS coordinate gives search units an exact starting point for drift models.
- **Good Samaritan Coordination:** When an emergency broadcast goes out, USCG command centers use AIS to identify nearby commercial ships that can divert and assist a vessel in distress long before a Coast Guard cutter or helicopter can arrive on the scene.



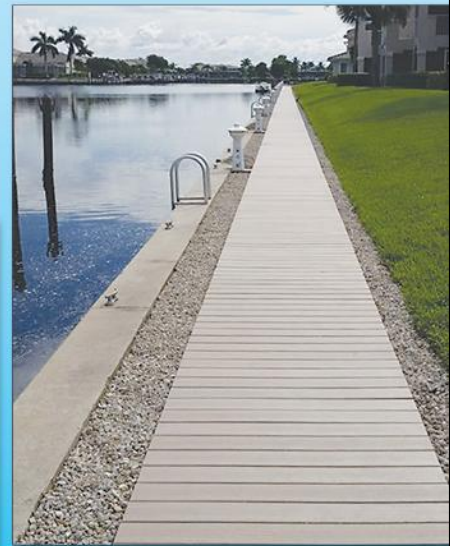
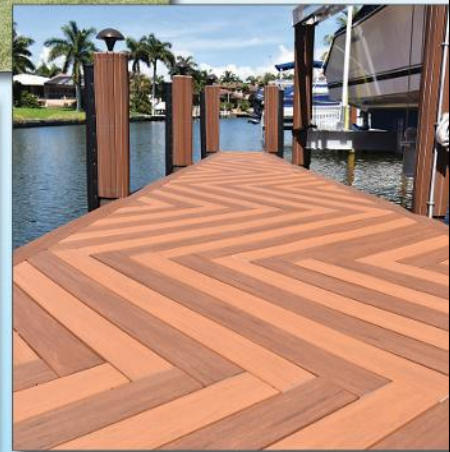
